# WHAT IS HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE?

**COMMON HHW ITEMS** 

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) are items used in and around your home that can be harmful or dangerous to humans, animals, and the environment. They may be toxic, corrosive, flammable, or reactive based on their chemical properties.

It's illegal and unsafe to dump HHW in the trash or down the drain. This Guide presents the many easy and free ways to safely remove and dispose of these items from your home.

#### DO NOT DUMP HHW IN THE TRASH OR DOWN THE DRAIN.





#### PAINT

Paints contain heavy metals like chromium, lead, and zinc. Specialty coatings such as urethanes, epoxy, and resins are hazardous in liquid form due to the toxicity of uncured resins and epoxies.



### **BATTERIES**

Batteries can corrode and allow harmful chemicals to leach into the soil and make their way into our water supply.

### **FLUORESCENT LIGHTS**



Fluorescent lights contain mercury, a neurotoxin, sealed within the glass tubing. Avoid breathing in vapors of broken fluorescent lamps. They are no longer sold in California.



#### **HOUSEHOLD CLEANERS**

Household cleaners often contain ingredients that are toxic, corrosive, or flammable.

### AUTOMOTIVE SUPPLIES

One quart of motor oil can pollute up to 250,000 gallons of clean water.

# HOW TO IDENTIFY A HAZARDOUS PRODUCT

Hazardous products contain ingredients that may be toxic, harmful, or pose other risks to health and safety, requiring us to use and handle them with care. It is crucial to always read and follow the safety instructions on the label.

Hazardous products contain a signal word indicating the level of toxicity, and possibly a hazard statement informing us of potential harm and a hazard pictogram.

### **Examples:**



**CAUTION**  $\rightarrow$  Slightly toxic. May cause slight eye or skin irritation.



**WARNING**  $\rightarrow$  Products with moderate toxicity. These products can cause moderate skin and eye damage.



**DANGER** $\rightarrow$  Corrosive. Causes severe skin and eye damage. Flammable, may cause fire.



**POISON**  $\rightarrow$  Extremely toxic ingredients. You may find this on pesticides, oven cleaners, or drain openers.

# **3 FREE WAYS TO SAFELY DISPOSE OF HHW**

### LOCAL DROP-OFF AT A COLLECTION CENTER NEAR YOU

Please be sure to call your desired location prior to dropping off to verify hours, limitations, and requirements.

### **BATTERIES, PAINT, FLUORESCENT LIGHTS**

### **USED MOTOR OIL AND FILTERS**

There are over 50 used oil and filter collection centers in San Mateo County, such as auto parts retailers, auto repair shops, and more. See the list and map of all locations <u>here</u>.

Selected HHW items accepted: batteries, fluorescent lights, paint, and used motor oil/filters. See the full list of items they accept <u>here</u>.

### PREPARING FOR YOUR FREE DROP-OFF AT AN HHW EVENT:

- Review the program rules and requirements, and the list of <u>items</u> that are and are not accepted.
- Schedule an appointment using our online appointment system, call (650) 372-6200, or email <u>hhw@smcgov.org</u>
- There is a 10 gallon (or 50 pound) maximum per vehicle, per appointment, and the maximum container size is 5 gallons.
- Over 10 gallons? Make multiple appointments. ONE APPOINTMENT PER VEHICLE.
- <u>Prepare for your appointment</u> and arrive at the drop-off location on your confirmed day and time.



Scan the QR code to schedule an appointment, get notified about upcoming events, and see the full list of accepted items.



### **CURBSIDE PICK-UP**

You may have curbside pickup options available to you! Check the list of haulers in San Mateo County for items eligible for curbside pickup. Contact your hauler for more information.

Many of the items collected at the County's household hazardous waste collection events are still in good condition. Some of these products include common household cleaners, auto supplies, fertilizers, wood preservatives, stains, and latex paint. The <u>Product Give Away Program</u> redistributes these products for free.

### LOOKING TO REDUCE HHW IN YOUR HOME?

Start with buying fewer cleaning products and choosing safer products!
